I attended boarding school from Grades 6 through 8. It was actually a military academy where we wore uniforms, stood in formation, drilled every day, exercised and studied in set times under strict supervision, and where cadets were expected to excel in the classroom as much as on the marching field. It was a disciplined way of life where we obeyed orders and were careful not to break the rules.

I actually got to enjoy military school, and the discipline and formation are still very much a part of my life. And yet, there was something missing – call it, if you will, the human touch: a kind word, a smile, a listening ear, an act of caring, a sign of affection. For these things, cadets had to look home.

So it was no surprise that cadets were overjoyed to be going home for the holidays. I still remember my Christmases at home – the Lionel trains around the Christmas tree, the gingerbread cookies, the peppermint candy sticks and the cinnamon candles. I remember the little plastic church that, when you turned the key, would play Silent Night. I remember the gathering of family and friends – there were always two or three tables filled with people. I remember the incredible food feasts on both Christmas Eve and Christmas Day, and to this day I think of the heavenly banquet as a kind of Christmas dinner. But most of all, I remember attending Christmas Eve Mass with family – always a special occasion where I literally felt "out of this world" with angels singing, shepherds adoring and peace on earth.

Whatever your own experiences of Christmas, I hope you will agree with me that it is good to go home for the holidays – to be with family, to connect with friends, to rekindle our desire for a better world, a more peaceful planet and a more hopeful future.

Most of all, Christmas is a time to reconnect with God, to experience once again the feeling of being loved totally, unconditionally and forever by a God who never gives up on us, no matter how far we stray from him. Yes, I know...none of us are perfect, but the good news is that God loves us in our imperfections. In Jesus God became as we are to show us how much he loves us as we are. You are loved, you are *really* loved, by a God would do anything to welcome you home.

So this holiday season, why not come home for Christmas? Here at St. James, Advent Sunday is December 2nd. In addition to our regular services, we plan on having a parish luncheon along with Advent family activities after the 10:30 Eucharist. Christmas Giving

A few weeks ago I attended a pension conference in Buffalo where a priest shared with me his experience of dire poverty in a Mexican slum. He then said something that startled me: that people in the United States spend more money on trash bags than people in 90 countries spend on everything. That suggests that Americans have an awful lot of stuff to throw away. That also suggests that people in 90 countries (and I presume they are from the poorest 90 countries) don't have the financial resources to buy much of anything. This is a stark, if not tragic, picture of the growing economic chasm between those who are rich and those who are poor.

We in Canada are not that much better than our American neighbours. According to Statistics Canada, 13.5 percent of Canadians live in poverty. Females in poverty are 14.2 percent. While these figures are disturbing, even more shocking is that billions of people in the world live on less than \$2 a day. Here in the London region welfare and government assistance rates have been rising each year for the past several years.

There is a temptation to think that knowing the numbers and feeling outrage somehow makes the situation better. It doesn't. I confess there are times when I am tempted to cynicism, making excuses for our poverty rate by citing Jesus' claim that "you will always have the poor with you" (Matthew 26:11). However, Jesus is telling us that people who are economically poor are part of the world's landscape as our brothers and sisters. And instead of trying to Photoshop them out of the picture (what politicians seem inclined to do), we had better try and do something about it.

So what do we do? Jesus is pretty clear about this. Give. He commends the widow for giving all that she had (Luke 21:4). He admonishes the rich young man

to sell all that he owns and give it away (Mark 10:21). One might think he is setting forth an economic policy that will cure poverty. He isn't. Jesus is proposing a spiritual discipline – a discipline of giving at a frequency and amount that will demonstrate to us that the accumulation of stuff which eventually fills our trash bags doesn't provide us with security or spiritual satisfaction.

There is a tipping point here: when we give sacrificially – beyond what initially feels comfortable – we are then better able to receive true and abiding riches by sharing with others. This is the paradox of the Christian life: the way to receive the blessings of God is to be a blessing to others. The only way to receive God's gifts is to share them with others.

The discipline of giving – and by giving I mean sacrificial giving rather than token giving – is a spiritual exercise that leads us to true freedom and joy. Jesus knew that. And he knew that the more we give away, the more free we feel – and the more inclined we are to work for the freedom of others.

May it be so!

Let's Talk About Heaven

An Advent Course Taught by Heather Nicolosi

Our Spiritual Life Facilitator Heather Nicolosi will lead a 3-part study of heaven as part of our Advent celebration. **Let's Talk about Heaven** will be held twice each week: on Sundays, December 2, 9 and 16 from 9:30 to 10:20 AM in the Westminster Lounge, and again on Wednesday mornings, December 5, 12 and 19 beginning at 10:30 AM in the Westminster Lounge.

Heaven is a hot topic right now! Books written by those of all ages who have had heavenly experiences are popping up all over. TV and radio interviews abound on the subject as interested commentators try to sort out what it all means. Do you fear death? Do you have questions about the afterlife? Are you curious to know what heaven is really like? If so, then this course is for you!

The course will explore the Biblical view of heaven, hell and all places in between along with personal accounts of several people who have had heavenly experiences and now live to tell about it. We will also examine what some Christians are starting to discover...that heaven is closer than you think!!



Journey Through the Book of Job

Dr. Nicolosi will lead a new Bible study beginning on **Sunday**, **January 13 from 9:30 to 10:20 AM** in the **Westminster Lounge** and continuing each Sunday until April 14. Journey through the Book of Job is a study of one of the most philosophical books in the Bible that dares to ask the question, "Why does God allow suffering, especially to the ones who do not deserve it?"

While the Book of Job does not give any easy answer to this question, in this 13-week course we will grapple with the issues that make faithful Christians cry out, "Why me, God?" and non-believers respond, "What God could possibly allow innocent suffering? Therefore, God must not exist."

If you have ever been challenged by suffering in your own life, or gone through a particularly tough time, or experienced a difficult ordeal, or if you have known others whose trials and tribulations have tested their faith or shaken their trust in God, then you will want to attend this course. Handouts will be distributed at each session. Here are the class titles:
